## EMBLEM



349 Organizational Maintenance Squadron emblem: On a blue disk, two stylized white cloud formations, the topmost cloud bearing two stylized yellow wings displayed horizontally surrounded by a blue horizontal rectangle on which are three horizontal stripes, while, red, white over which is a blue disk bearing a white five-pointed star, the cloud in base charged with a white bear detailed brown, on a green mound before a red suspension bridge vignetted with green rocks; arched between two clouds originating in dexter flank a white smoky contrail becoming n white speed line, countercharged blue on the white upper cloud and white on the blue background, terminating in buck of a stylized brawn silhouetted aircraft in a gradual decent m the sinister top of the lower cloud. Attached above the disk is a blank blue scroll. Attached below the disk a blue scroll, inscribed PROUDLY WE SERVE in yellow letters SIGNIFICANCE: The blue field represents the heavens and the divine goal for which man has aspired since the beginning of time, The white clouds represent the heights and purity of our convictions that keep aloft the golden wings that serve its in peace, and in war. These wings are pined to the clouds by our heritage represented by the lone star and three stripes of our great air force, The bridge is the spin of a military career sound and worthy of passage, One side of the bridge is anchored on the rock solid principals of our founding fathers, the other side is yet unfinished to be completed when all the world can be free of oppressive regimes, suppression of inalienable rights and censorship of speech. The bear is a symbol of strength guarding the gates of our great land poised to strike without hesitation should it be warranted. Finally, the aircraft which proudly soars, returning home from a successful mission only made possible by the devotion to duty by the quality men and women of our great Air Force.

The ultramarine blue field represents the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, the heavens and the divine goal for which man has aspired since the beginning of time. The white cloud represent the heights and purity of unit member convictions that keep aloft the Air Force yellow wings that serve the nation in peace and in war. The wings are pinned to the clouds by our heritage as shown by the lone star and three stripes of the historic Air Force insignia. The bridge is the span of a military career, sound and worthy of passage. One side of the bridge is anchored on the rock solid principals of our founding fathers, the far side is yet unfinished to be completed when all the world can be free of oppressive regimes, suppression of inalienable rights and censorship of speech. The bear is a symbol of strength guarding the gates of this great land and poised to strike without hesitation should it be warranted. Finally, the aircraft proudly soars expressing a successful mission made possible by the quality Air Force men and women of the unit and their devotion to duty.
