MISSION

The 1 SOMXG is one of the Air Force's largest maintenance groups and supports the 1 SOW mission by meeting key objectives: mobilizing personnel, equipment and supplies; training maintenance personnel; and sustaining combat readiness capabilities. They also operate Air Force Special Operations Command's Centralized Repair Facilities for C-130 Isochronal Inspections, C-130 avionics and T56 engines, which allow special operations aircraft to execute missions in multiple continental U.S., outside continental U.S. and AOR locations. The aircraft generation and maintenance squadrons stand ready when on- and off-equipment, organizational- or intermediate-level maintenance is necessary ... Any Time, Any Place.

The group is composed of more than 2,000 Air Commandos assigned to the following four squadrons:

- 1 Special Operations Maintenance Squadron
- 1 Special Operations Aircraft Maintenance Squadron
- 801 Special Operations Aircraft Maintenance Squadron
- 901 Special Operations Aircraft Maintenance Squadron

Through the combined efforts of these units, the group supports the AC-130U Spooky, AC-130J Ghosthunter, CV-22 Osprey, MC-130H Combat Talon II and PC-12/U-28 aircraft that make up the 1st SOW inventory.

EMBLEM



Base Headquarters and 1 Air Base Squadron emblem



1 Service Group emblem Azure, on a bend in front of a lightning bolt bend sinisterwise or, a

five link chain of the first.



The emblem of the 1 Special Operations Maintenance Group is that of the 1 Special Operations Wing with the group designation in the scroll. It is symbolic of the organization's history and mission. The blue background represents the sky and the United States Air Force. The 13 red and white stripes stand for the nation's original 13 colonies, the first American force to engage in war to defend freedom. The silver dagger is winged to indicate the 1 Special Operations Wing brings force through the air. A golden lamp of knowledge reflects the wing's civic action role and indicates that members of the 1 Special Operations Wing serve as teachers, as well as warriors, in helping our allies determine their own way of life and form of government.
