The Flying Bobcat, also on the patch, represents the 200th Airlift Squadron (200 AS), Colorado Air National Guard. The Guard unit flew and maintained the T-43A, the last aircraft used by the 50.

OPERATIONS

Combat as corps observation unit with I Army Corps, 12 Sep-6 Nov 1918; working principally with III Corps School, instructed personnel of ground services in mission and functions of military aviation, Dec 1918-Apr 1919.

The Fiftieth Aero Squadron reached the Front at Bicqueley near Toul on September 8th. It engaged in the operations at St. Mihiel and the Argonne-Meuse first and second offensives. It ceased operations April 1, 1919. This squadron made many reconnaissance's over the lines, taking

many pictures and gathering much useful information, during the accomplishment of which it fought off many German attacks and was credited with one victory. It suffered nine casualties, consisting of 5 killed, 2 wounded, and 2 prisoners.

Demonstrations of effectiveness of aerial bombardment on warships, Jun-Sep 1921.

Organized in December 1927 with Organized Reserve personnel as a RAI unit at Dodd Field, TX.

Organized Reserve officers assigned to the unit participated in summer training at Kelly Field, TX, 1928. Designated mobilization training station was Dodd Field, TX, 1927-29.

Withdrawn from the Eighth Corps Area on 27 October 1928 and allotted to the Second Corps Area. Assigned on 13 February 1929 to the 9th Observation Group.

Organized on 27 May 1929 with Organized Reserve personnel as a RAI unit at Mitchel Field, NY.

Activated on 1 November 1930, less Reserve personnel, at Luke Field, TH. Search missions from Hawaii, 8 Dec 1941-Jul 1942; May-Oct 1943. Combat in Central Pacific, Jun 1942; May, Tun, Jul, Sep 1943; in South and Southwest Pacific, 2 Aug 1942-16 Feb 1943; and in Central and Western Pacific, 13 Nov 1943-12 Aug 1945.

Photomapping in Philippines, Formosa, and the Pescadores, 1946-1947

The 50 Education Squadron mission is to produce officers schooled in the application of Air and Space power. The squadron is divided into two divisions: Military Applications Division and Battlespace Exploitation Division.

Shaw Air Force Base's newest addition, the MQ-9 Reaper group, is activating its 50 Attack Squadron this morning and holding an assumption of command ceremony. Col. Joseph Campo, commander of the 432nd Operations Group at Creech Air Force Base in Nevada, is presiding over the ceremony in which Col. David John is assuming command of the squadron, according to Shaw. Shaw's 50 ATKS is a subordinate of the 432nd OG. "The squadron, which operates MQ-9 Reaper aircraft, will bring operators to Shaw, but no additional aircraft will relocate as a result of the activation," states a news release. It was announced last year that Shaw was the preferred base to get a new Reaper group after an Air Combat Command program identified ways to improve on concerns identified by airmen and their families in the RPA career fields.
