OPERATIONS

It was officially announced that the 107th Fighter Group headquarters, the 207th Air Service Group headquarters detachment, the 136th Fighter Squadron and the 152nd Aircraft Warning and Control Group headquarters will be located at Niagara Falls as part of the New York National Guard's new 52nd Fighter Wing. Announcement of this historic slap by the New York National Guard was made by Lt. Gen. Hugh A. Drum, commanding general of the state guard.

It will mean that the Niagara Fads airport will be base for 25 P-47 Thunderbolts of the 136th squadron, plus a C-47 transport plane, two AT-6s, two AT-11s, two L-5s and four tow target planes, as a utility flight section of the squadron. In addition, the flying squadron is expected to eventually have a Type A weather station at the airport and an air warning and control group.

Also based here will be the 207th Air Service Group headquarters with maintenance personnel to service the planes; the 152nd Aircraft Warning and Control Group headquarters, and the 107th Aircraft Warning and Control Squadron.

Richard C. Bonhurst, manager of the Niagara Falls airport, said the National Guard air units will be housed in the government controlled area and buildings just north of the Bell Aircraft plant. The units will use all facilities of the municipal airport on a fee basis.

Gen. Drum announced that federal instructors have already been assigned to the New York units, with Col. Erickson Nichols as senior instructor for the wing. Col. Peter H. Remington has been named group instructor for the 107th Fighter Group. Instructors for the 136th Fighter Squadron and Utility Flight have not yet Been assigned.

Gen. Drum announced that the new 52nd Fighter Wing would have 14,000 National Guardsmen and 196 planes when at full strength and added that the War department has already allocated the planes. The wing well be a self-contained air combat force with weather, aircraft warning and aviation engineer squadrons, he said. Units comprising the wing will be the 106th Bombardment Group, consisting of two squadrons of A-26 attack bombers, with headquarters at Mitchel Field, New York, and the 107th Group, consisting of the four squadrons as mentioned above.
