MISSION

The 56 Maintenance Operations Squadron ensures the health of a fleet of more than 180 USAF and Foreign Military Sales F-16 aircraft. The squadron provides extensive maintenance analysis data, maintains oversight of wing plans, scheduling, and documentation areas, and serves as the nerve center for all maintenance actions through the Maintenance Operations Center. Several other critical functions include the collection, tracking and forecasting of engine data for 200 engines and managing the end-of-runway operation providing the critical "last look" for every aircraft prior to take-off.

The Quality Assurance office evaluates maintenance activities and provides feedback to key leadership. The Weapons Standardization Section qualifies, certifies, and evaluates weapons loading and maintenance crews. The Maintenance Training Flight provides aircraft maintenance and ancillary training for over 3,000 personnel, and is the liaison between Detachment 12, 372d Training Squadron, and base training. The squadron also manages environmental, safety, information technology, mobility, vehicle, facility and manpower programs for the entire 56th Maintenance Group.

EMBLEM



56th Logistics Support Squadron emblem: Azure, in sinister base a globe Celeste land masses Veii, in dexter chief three flight symbols ascending bendwise each issuing a contrail arcing to sinister base of the globe Argent, all below an arc of nine mullets in sinister chief of the like; all within a diminished bordure Or. Attached below the disc a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border. **SIGNIFICNACE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The flight symbols arcing from the globe denote the unit's support of the Wing's mission of "Global Reach, Global Power "The stars represent the fighter squadron directly supported by the unit.
