

EMBLEM

On an Air Force blue curved band, edged Air Force golden yellow, a bezant charged with an atomic symbol of three orbits encircling a nucleus, red, all between a white cloud formation issuing from dexter surmounted by an Air Force golden yellow missile in flight upwards and a red lightning flash issuing from chief and pointing downwards and issuing from sinister a white cloud formation surmounting a green olive branch and surmounted by an Air Force golden yellow missile in flight upwards. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. Against a deep blue background with clouds to represent the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, an air force golden yellow disc bears an atomic symbol to indicate this unit's nuclear potential. The olive branch indicates peace is our profession and the ordnance on each side of the emblem represents missile capability. The entire emblem represents strength to maintain peace. It bears the Air Force colors, ultramarine blue and golden yellow and the national colors, red, white and blue. (Approved, 14 Sep 1961)
