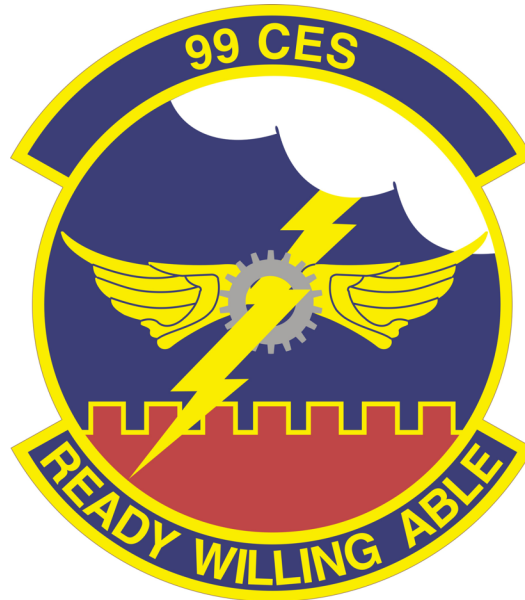

### EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, a base embattled Gules fimbriated Or, a cloud issuant from sinister chief Argent

issuing overall throughout a lightning bolt bendwise sinister enfiling a gear wheel at fesspoint Gray, winged fesswise throughout of the third, garnished of the first, all within a diminished bordure Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "99 CES" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "READY WILLING ABLE" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The cloud and lightning flash reflect the Squadron's lineage to the 99th Air Base Wing and indicate the dedication to work in all environments, no matter how harsh, to defend freedom. The embattled base signifies the unit's dedication to mission, and the merlons are indicative of the cooperation of the seven operational flights of civil engineering in providing a foundation for defense. The winged gear symbolizes the complete dedication of the Squadron to support the flying mission and the resolution to deploy anywhere needed.
